Sports Premium Spending 2022/23

We believe that an innovative, varied PE curriculum and extra-curricular opportunities have a positive influence on the concentration, attitude and academic achievement of our children. We also recognise the importance of PE to the health and well-being of our pupils.

Our Sports Premium Funding will enable us to expand our PE provision to allow increased PE for every pupil and allow for greater participation in sport in the community. This will also include increasing the range of sports we provide to our pupils.

What is the Sports Premium?

The government has provided funding to provide extended and substantial primary school sport funding. The funding is provided jointly by the Department for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport and will see money going directly to schools to spend on improving the quality of sport and PE for all their pupils. The money can only be spent on sport and PE provision.

Purpose of the funding

This funding is allocated to schools in order to improve their sports and PE provision, in a way which best suits the schools and the needs of its pupils.

Our aims for the year included:

- To resource Bure Park as a new school with sufficient and appropriate PE resources to give the boys a comprehensive and wide range of physical activity opportunities.
- To widen the range of sporting activities during the residential time.

Objectives of spending

- To engage as many pupils as possible in the widest range of physical activities.
- To develop a better overall perception of sport and physical activity
